# Intelligence Update – January 2018

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## Updates from PHE's National Knowledge and Intelligence teams

- **Risk Factors**

- **National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP) Local Authority Profile**

The [NCMP Local Authority Profile online data tool](#) for child obesity for England was updated on 9 January 2018. This annual update adds data for the academic year 2016 to 2017 at local authority (LA) level. It also includes a new 'severe obesity' indicator, not reported separately before. Severely obese children are at risk of developing a number of serious acute and chronic health problems. These children therefore pose a significant concern in terms of their health and well-being, and may require the provision of specialist services. Although in relative terms the prevalence of severe obesity is low, in absolute terms this represents a large number of children nationally (14,787 Reception children and 22,646 Year 6 children). Severe obesity prevalence in children has strong associations with ethnic group, deprivation and sex, and there is significant variation in prevalence across the country.

The NCMP tool displays the prevalence of obesity, overweight, healthy weight and underweight at local, regional and national level over time, for children in Reception (aged 4 to 5 years) and Year 6 (aged 10 to 11 years). Users can compare LA data by region or between 'CIPFA nearest neighbours' (LAs with similar characteristics). The tool also presents inequalities in obesity prevalence by sex, deprivation and ethnic group by LA. In addition, trend data for England for obesity prevalence and overweight (including obese) prevalence in boys and girls has been brought together in one place. - **Epidemiology and Surveillance**

- **Public Health Outcomes Framework**

In line with the Official Statistics release cycle, on 6 February 2018, Public Health England will publish an update to the [Public Health Outcomes Framework](#) (PHOF) data tool.

- **Clinical Epidemiology**

- The [Falls and Fragility Fractures Pathway](#) has been developed in collaboration with the National Clinical Director for Musculoskeletal Services (Peter Kay), Public Health England (PHE), the National Osteoporosis Society (NOS) and a range of other stakeholders from across the health and care system.

- The Pathway defines the key interlocking components for an optimal system for prevention and management. It also defines the priority higher value interventions that systems should focus on to address variation, improve outcomes, reduce cost and contribute toward a sustainable NHS.
- Central to the guidance provided by the Pathway is a [Falls and Fractures National Consensus Statement and Resource Pack](#), published by Public Health England in January 2017. The resources in the pathway also draw on a range of other national

guidance and contain examples of best practice from across England to help make change on the ground.

- Join us for a [webinar](#) providing you with an overview of the NHS RightCare Falls and Fragility Fractures Pathway and PHE National Consensus Statement and Resource Pack. To illustrate the practical application of these two valuable resources, the webinar will also include a patient's story and examples of how they have been used to support and promote service improvements.

- **Methodological updates**

- A report assessing three options for [reducing random variation in the local area health state life expectancies](#) has been published by the Office for National Statistics (ONS). There is also a consultation on the [proposed methodological changes](#) which closes on 8 February 2018.
- NHS Digital are running a consultation on ways to improve the '[Smoking, Drinking and Drug Use Among Young People in England \(SDD\)](#)' survey, which is designed to monitor smoking, drinking and drug use among secondary school pupils aged 11 to 15. The consultation closes on 30 January 2018.
- The consultation on [methodological changes to NHS Health Check](#) continues. Public Health England has made four recommendations to change the methodology used for estimating the NHS Health Check total eligible population and to report activity after 2017-18. ## Health Intelligence Network updates

- **Child and Maternal Health Intelligence Network (ChiMat)**

- Data for child health has recently been updated in the [General Practice Profiles](#). Information about the size of the child population, A&E attendance, hospital admissions for common conditions and outpatient appointments have all been updated. In addition to viewing data for individual practice profiles, you can view summary profiles for CCGs, and each practice can be compared with the CCG and England.

- **National Cancer Registration and Analysis Service (NCRAS)**

- The partnership between NCRAS, the Transforming Services Cancer Team (TCST) and Macmillan has updated the [cancer prevalence workbook](#) to the end of 2015. This update provides views by more demographic measures and new sub-national geographies, such as

cancer alliance and STP. Data is provided for cancer prevalence in England from 1995-2015 for people who were alive on the 31 December 2015. The data is presented by sex and cancer type, and by either time since diagnosis, age at diagnosis, age in 2015, deprivation, ethnicity (10 year) or stage at diagnosis (4 year). It is presented for the following geographies: England, region, cancer alliance, STP, and CCG.

- The latest iteration of the [Routes to Diagnosis](#) work has been released. This now covers a full decade of cancer diagnoses from 2006-2015. The release shows whether cancers were diagnosed through screening, Two Week Wait, GP referral or as an emergency. Breakdowns by year, ethnicity, sex, and deprivation are available for 55 cancer sites. One-year survival by Route is included as well as CCG-level data for major cancers. There is a new website for the [data workbooks](#), which also includes data visualisation.

- **National End of Life care Intelligence Network (NEoLCIN)**

- The latest provisional rolling data on [annual deaths in usual place of residence](#) 2015-16 Q1 to 2017-18 Q2 is now available on the NEoLCIN website. This is a performance indicator for end of life care and focuses on place of death, namely 'usual place of residence', as a proxy marker for quality. 'Usual place of residence' includes deaths that occurred at home, care home or religious establishment. The indicator is produced quarterly on a rolling 12-month basis for all Strategic Clinical Networks, PHE Centres, CCGs and Local Authorities in England. - **National Mental Health Dementia and Neurology Intelligence Network (NMHDNIN)**

- [Mental health and wellbeing JSNA profile](#): one community mental health team indicator in the quality and outcomes domain will be updated at CCG and STP level (Quarter 2 2017 to 2018) and one GP prescribing indicator in the finance domain will be updated at CCG and STP level (Quarter 1 2017 to 2018)
- [Severe mental illness](#): two community mental health team indicators in the outcomes domain will be updated at MH Trust, CCG and STP level (Quarter 2 2017 to 2018) and one GP prescribing indicator in the finance domain will be updated at CCG and STP level (Quarter 1 2017 to 2018)

- The [Co-occurring substance misuse and mental health issues profiling tool](#) was updated in December 2017. Indicators on substance misuse treatment (numbers in treatment, rates of concurrent substance misuse and mental health treatment and waiting times) were updated with 2016 to 2017 data. Other items derived from other tools on Fingertips have been updated with the latest available data.

- **National Cardiovascular Health Intelligence Network (NCVIN)**

- The first report/paper looking at the early progress of the [Healthier You: NHS Diabetes Prevention Programme](#) (DPP) has been published. The report summarises progress of the DPP, including referrals, uptake and participant characteristics. There were 43,603 referrals received, 16% higher than expected. Of those referred, 49% attended the initial assessment, higher than the 40% modelled uptake. Attendance rates were higher in Black, Asian, Mixed and other ethnicity compared to white, and higher in those from the most deprived quintile compared to the least. Characteristics of attendees suggest that the programme is reaching those who are both at greater risk of developing Type 2 diabetes and who typically access healthcare less effectively. - The updated [Blood pressure: How can we do better? packs](#), published in partnership with the British Heart Foundation and others, will be available mid-January. They give recommendations for GP practices and CCGs on how they can improve care for patients with high blood pressure. There are also intelligence packs for each CCG.
- The [AF: How can we do better? packs](#) have also been updated and will be available on the [Stroke Association website](#) in mid-January. There are intelligence packs for each CCG and these give practical tips to GP practices and CCGs on how they can get better at preventing and treating strokes.

## NHS Right Care

- **Addressing the variation in Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD)**

The [NHS RightCare Pathway for COPD](#) provides commissioners, providers and local health economies with guidance, developed in collaboration with experts in COPD and respiratory conditions, on how to ensure early detection, accurate diagnosis and to optimise long-term management to reduce exacerbations, hospital admissions and premature mortality and improve patient outcomes and care.

- **Preventing and managing Stroke: NHS RightCare Pathway published**

As part of the ongoing commitment by NHS England to prevent stroke and improve treatment and outcomes, NHS RightCare has published the [NHS RightCare Pathway for Stroke](#). Developed with the Stroke Association, the pathway details interlocking components for an optimal system for prevention and management of stroke, and the priority higher value interventions that local health economies should focus on to address variation, improve outcomes, reduce cost and contribute toward a sustainable NHS.

## NHS Digital

- PHE and NHS Digital are meeting quarterly to discuss the progress that local authorities are making with respect to data access, particularly with respect to Hospital Episode Statistics (HES) and Primary Care Mortality Database (PCMD) data. This group includes representation from local authorities.

Below are the highlights from the November meeting:

- PCMD - 105 LAs have applied for PCMD access and there are 91 LAs with live access
- HES extract - 37 LAs have applied for HES access and there are 35 LAs with live access
- HES Data Interrogation System (HDIS) - 49 LAs have applied for HDIS access and there are 40 LAs with live access.

- NHS Digital are visiting LKIS networks to discuss local issues with respect to data access, and several of these workshops have already taken place.
- NHS Digital are planning to run a further series of webinars on applying for data, using DARS on-line and understanding fair processing. The webinar programme is publicised on the DARS webpage with links to allow you to register.

The new regulations will impact almost every area of local government business, and organisations who fail to prepare for these changes leave themselves open to heavy penalties.

These describe variation in the demographics of those who fall, time of day and year, the proportion of patients conveyed to hospital, maps of falls and analysis of falls at home.
