
# Introduction

Welcome to issue seven of the Yorkshire and Humber and North East TB Control Board (YHNE TBCB) update.

Since the last update (September 2017) we have embedded the new structure of the YHNE TBCB (figure 1 below) to ensure it can effectively support our priorities for the next 2 years whilst also making the best use of the time that stakeholders are able to contribute to the work.

Whilst the TBCB continues to be a merged group of the North East and Yorkshire and the Humber, members recognise the distinct needs of both areas, hence why the North East have their own specific multiagency network and nurse forum.

The subgroups (paediatrics, LTBI and MDR TB) have all been very active, as have the nurse forums and we have also developed additional areas of work as detailed below.

# Subgroup updates

#### **Paediatrics**

The paediatric subgroup has been very active since the last update. Work includes:

# • Paediatric TB Network event, 18 January 2018

Chaired by Dr Suzi Coles, PHE and attended by around 60 stakeholders, the subgroup hosted a multiagency event to look at paediatric TB in Yorkshire and Humber and the North East. The

afternoon consisted of a number of presentations, these included Dr Fiona Shackley, Sheffield Children's Hospital, Dr Jonathan Cohen, The British Association for Paediatric Tuberculosis and Mary Cronin, PHE Field Epidemiology Service. There was plenty of opportunity for networking and discussions and the latter part of the event focussed on case studies from Leeds and Hull.

### Regional paediatric guidelines

The subgroup has developed a document which summarises national guidance and provides clarity on a number of contentious points. This is in draft and will be circulated to stakeholders for comments.


# • Paediatric TB mapping

Based on national guidance, the subgroup has recently produced a useful document which details current TB paediatric provision in Yorkshire and Humber and the North East at local authority level. The work usefully identified a number of gaps in provision which are now being addressed by the group.

## Factors affecting transmission of paediatric TB in Yorkshire and Humber

Previous reports demonstrated that TB rates in children in Yorkshire and the Humber remained static between 2001-2011 with no significant decline over time, and that rates in UK-born



children were higher, than the national average. As a result of this the subgroup carried out a piece of work to investigate:

- The incidence of TB in Y&H in children <15 years 2012 2016, including indications of local transmission (such as incidence in UK-born children)
- The factors associated with transmission to children more generally
- The root causes of transmission to children in Y&H and the consideration of a root cause analysis tool to assist this investigation

This work has now been completed and the final report will be made available in due course.

### **MDR TB**

An event took place on 14 November, 2017 in Leeds to discuss MDR TB. The aims of the day were to:

- Share the latest epidemiology, clinical practice and developments regarding MDR TR
- Understand national and international guidance
- Work collectively to create solutions to local problems
- Discuss case studies and use them as an opportunity to learn lessons and make recommendations
- Provide an opportunity for networking

75 people attended the day, most of whom were nurses and hospital consultants from both Yorkshire and Humber and the North East. Some microbiologists and public health specialists also attended. CDP points were awarded for attendance. The day was chaired by Dr Renu Bindra, YHNE TBCB Chair and consisted of a number of presentations as well and case study discussions and question and answer sessions. Presentations were well received and included the following:

- What is the contribution of WGS to the diagnostics and management of MDR TB?

There was also plenty of opportunity for networking during the breaks and stakeholders reported this being a very useful part of the day, with many not having previously met their peers in other areas.

Overall the event was well received and there was an appetite for future events which will be discussed at the MDR TB subgroup. All presentations are available on the YHNE TBCB SharePoint site.

#### LTBI

All nationally LTBI funded CCG areas (Leeds, Bradford, Sheffield, North Kirklees and Greater Huddersfield) are continuing with their testing and treatment programmes. An exciting development since the last update has been the recruitment of a dedicated LTBI project manager who is able to provide support to the CCGs and local stakeholders to improve the programme of work. The post holder Adele Mackin is employed by Greater Huddersfield CCG but her role is to improve testing uptake in all areas and ensure the full pathway is working. There are some concerns about testing activity and referral pathways which are being addressed. In addition to this, the evaluation of the first year of the programme has now been produced and is informing the work plan going forward.

## **North East Network update**

The North East TB network met on 30 October 2017. Dr Ed Ong gave an update on MDR TB, and Dr Jim MacFarlane chaired a series of discussions of complex cases presented by clinicians from around the region. The network agreed a plan describing our aspirations for TB in the North East in 2020 and the work needed to reach these.

The network will be meeting again in April 2018 (date to be confirmed). Among other actions over the coming year, the network will be considering the capacity and workload of TB teams and reviewing the North East approach to cohort review.

Last month, the North East's annual review of Tuberculosis covering 2016 was published. This confirmed that the North East remains one of the lowest TB incidence regions in England. However, incidence in the North East has been static while the incidence in England has declined, and there is considerable variation between localities and population groups in the North East.

The vast majority of North East cases were either born in the UK (42%) or have lived here for at least two years (51%). As we know that a diagnosis of TB is not always considered in the UK born population, and more than a third of North East patients (34%) do not start treatment until more than four months after symptom onset, we will be using the opportunity of World TB Day (24 March) to remind GPs to consider a diagnosis of TB when patients present with compatible symptoms.

#### **Yorkshire and Humber Nurse Forum**

The Yorkshire and Humber TB Nurse Forum meet 3 times a year to bring together TB nurses, health visitors and practitioners from across the region to share good practice, provide peer support and access to educational opportunities. Key areas of work currently include:

- Workforce and training. The group has identified training needs for the forum and agreed speakers at each meeting during 2018. The sessions will provide nurses with CDP points and include themes on paediatrics and drug interactions.
- Nurse competency framework the RCN have now published the new framework which includes standards for TB nurses. The forum is looking at the implications of this document and will be working with the TBCB to implement a programme of work.

# **Educational TB event, Hull 10 April**

An educational event in Hull is being planned to mark World TB Day on 24 March and also the opening of a new infectious diseases ward at Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals (Castle Hill site). The ward will have 6 negative pressure rooms to cater for TB and other respiratory infection patients.

There will be a number of presentations from local and regional experts including:

A local and national overview

- A historical look at local TB service provision and epidemiology and how it's changed over time
- The new ward and its facilities
- The latest in diagnostics and treatment

Yorkshire and Humber TB Clinical Network, Inaugural meeting 6 March 2018
The YHNE TBCB is holding the first meeting of the Yorkshire & Humber TB Clinical
Network during the afternoon on 6 March in Leeds and is inviting TB clinicians to

# LTBI (non-programmatic) task and finish group (YH)

Whilst the national programme to implement LTBI testing and treatment for 16 to 35 year olds who have recently arrived in the UK from high incidence countries (>150 per 100,000) is well underway in Yorkshire the TBCB want to ensure LTBI screening arrangements are in place for all new migrants in Yorkshire and Humber irrespective of whether they are resident in an area receiving NHSE funding as per national guidance (high incidence countries are defined by NICE as >40 per 100,000). In addition to this consideration is also being given to the following under-served populations (USPs):

- some migrant groups, including asylum seekers, refugees and those in immigration detention
- people in contact with the criminal justice system
- people who misuse drugs or alcohol
- · people with mental health needs
- people who are homeless

A scoping exercise has been undertaken to look at current provision and need and a task and finish group has been established to take the work forward.


Various work is taking place to address the national priorities, further information can be found **here** and you can also subscribe to regular **TB strategy updates**.

### **TB Nurse Competency Framework**

The RCN published the framework in December 2017 in response to the TB nurse workforce review (2015). The document is aimed at nurses working in TB, those thinking about entering TB nursing and those who have roles in identifying those with TB / at risk of TB. It can be used in annual appraisals to support CDP and also provides a tool for managers and commissioners to help understand the needs for service planning and workforce review.

Template job descriptions are being developed and work is planned with HEE to address TB workforce training needs.

advocating for equity of access and to foster co-operation, friendship and mutual support between all those involved in the care of children with TB.



# The Royal Society of Medicine, TB control enters the genomic area: A world first for UK public health, 22 March 2018, London

This year's TB meeting the focus will be is devoted to the development and implementation of whole genome sequencing (WGS) of how mycobacterium tuberculosis isolates in routine practice. The UK is the first country in the world to implement this technology for routine diagnosis, antibiotic resistance profiling and surveillance. The day will focus on clinical, epidemiological and logistical advantages and implications of WGS.
