Our Sanctuary resolution

We will be safe, neutral, welcoming spaces, accessible to all. Our staff and volunteers will be trained to understand issues faced by sanctuary seekers and provide support.

We will provide free, low-cost activities to support specific needs of communities and engage with sanctuary seekers and organisations to ensure our services are relevant. We will work in partnership with others to promote inclusion, extend the sanctuary movement, and highlight the positive contribution of sanctuary seekers.



How have we achieved our aims?

- A specific 'Libraries of Sanctuary' team trained and committed to making a difference.
- Regularly evaluating of our offer alongside a program of engagement with sanctuary seekers.
- Maintaining a core of information specifically targeted at sanctuary seekers, which is regularly updated and shared with our workforce and partners.
- Free access to books including community and dual language books and Reading Well collection are available in our libraries and as part of our e-book collection at <u>Kirklees Overdrive</u>.
- Free access to <u>Pressreader</u>, allowing people to read international publications that would otherwise not be available in the UK.
- Free access to e-resources such as <u>Go Citizen</u>, which helps people prepare for the Life in the UK test.
- Free public access I.T. for all library members.
- Volunteering opportunities.
- Formal ID no longer needed to become a library member.
- ESOL provision including informal library run conversation groups and signposting to more formal courses via #KirkleesWelcomes.
- Regular events such as 'Meet, Try, Learn' and 'Refugee Week' and special one off events, such as Eid and Christmas parties.

Library of Sanctuary Impact Stories

Library champions create a welcome space for new comers

Fleeing war in Ukraine, a family finds refuge in Slaithwaite. Despite language barriers and initial fear, the local library becomes a lifeline. The friendly staff provide a welcoming space for the family. Weekly programs like "craft and chat" and a social cafe foster connection and community. Mariia, expresses deep gratitude to the library staff for lifting their spirits and believing in them during this challenging time.

Homestart Partnership

A lonely new mother, who fled her country with a premature baby, found solace through a partnership between Home-Start and Kirklees Libraries and received support from both organisations. The library provided a safe space for connection via English classes, craft sessions and books in her native language. This helped the mother reduce loneliness, build confidence in caring for her baby, and even develop friendships with other mothers.

"I felt isolated in Kirklees (living in a hotel room) and was having a difficult time with mental health challenges. I felt lost, frightened, and so alone. I was a first-time mum with a tiny baby. As my baby grew, I was not sure when I was supposed to start weaning her. I needed support to know I was doing everything right."

"My Health Visitor spoke to me about further support and passed on my details for one-to-one volunteer support with Home Start Kirklees."

Art in Exile

We hosted an "Art in Exile" installation at Batley Library for Refugee Week.

Photos and films with personal stories from refugees, aimed to raise awareness of their experiences.

26 attendees, including new library visitors, were deeply engaged by the installation.

Many commented on learning a lot and gaining a new perspective on the refugee journey.

Attendees expressed a desire for similar events, showcasing the impact on both the community and the library itself.

- Feels Like Home is a group for people new to Barnsley for whom English isn't their first language.
- There are around 60 regular attendees from a wider membership of over 160+ people.
- The group includes refugees, migrant workers, students and asylum seekers from all backgrounds
- Countries represented in the group are... El Salvador, Afghanistan, Albania, Egypt, Sudan, Iran, Ukraine, Cape Verde, Russia, Pakistan, Syria, Poland, Malaysia, Kurdistan, Portugal, Thailand, Sudan, and many more.

"Thank you for making me feel like a human being again".



- Learning English through Barnsley's heritage; taking part in cultural projects
- The group helps people to make friends in an unfamiliar place
- The group helps people to get on in life after difficult times
- They have their own support network and WhatsApp group
- They named themselves Feels Like Home and call themselves a family

- Access to bicycles to help isolated members get around
- Linking up members in a crisis and helping to provide food and basic utilities
- Helping members with uni, volunteering and job applications we have members who have completed masters degrees, have become policemen and council workers, or volunteer for Age UK
- Interpreting coronavirus guidance, providing data and devices for the group to meet – Community Champions helping to encourage vaccination
- Close connections with group members, some of whom are struggling with trauma, PTSD, anxiety, depression and other mental health conditions
