- **All Our Health: e-learning sessions**

Updates from PHE's Population Health Analysis team

- **Updates to PHE Official Statistics Profiles**

In line with the [Official Statistics release cycle](#), on 05 November 2019, the Population Health Analysis team published an update to the following tools: [Public Health Outcomes Framework \(PHOF\)](#) data tool, the [Local Tobacco Control Profile](#) and [Physical Activity Tool](#). - **Physical Activity Tool**

PHE's [Physical activity tool](#) brings together data on physical activity, active travel, obesity and related factors. It been updated to include the latest data on active travel, as well as some supplementary data on physical activity. The update includes:

- a new data point for two active travel indicators; [percentage of people walking for travel](#) and [percentage of people cycling for travel](#), and inequalities data for previous time points of two physical activity indicators.
- The proportion of [physically active adults](#) and the proportion of [physically inactive adults](#) indicators can now be segmented by the new Local Authorities and by level of education.

- **National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP)**

2018/19 NCMP data has been released and the [The NCMP and Child Obesity Profile](#) will be updated with this latest data on 03 December.

Health Intelligence Network updates

- **Child and Maternal Health Intelligence Network (ChiMat)**

- Children's public health for 0 to 5-year-olds

There is firm evidence that public health in the early years can achieve good health and wellbeing for children now and in the future. This is brought together in the national [Healthy Child Programme](#), the 0-5 element of which is led by health visiting services. Annual data for 2018 to 2019 and Quarter 1 for 2019 to 2020 was [published](#) for local authorities, PHE centres and others to inform the development of these services locally on 05 November:

- The [breastfeeding at 6-to-8 weeks-after-birth statistics](#) show the percentage of babies who are breastfed at 6 to 8 weeks.
- The [health visitor service delivery metrics](#) cover the antenatal check, new birth visit, 6-to-8 week review, 12 month assessment and 2-to-2½ year assessment (including coverage of the [Ages and Stages Questionnaire](#) (ASQ-3)).
- The [child development outcomes at 2-to-2½ years data](#) looks at children who were at or above the expected level for various child development outcomes using data from the ASQ-3 questionnaire.

- Annual update to child education indicators

On 05 November, some child education indicators in the [child and maternal health profiles in PHE's Fingertips tool were updated](#). The indicators look at persistent absentees in primary and secondary school and skills development at key stages 1 and 2 and are available for upper tier local authorities, regions and England. Recent changes to methodology and data quality in the source data used to calculate family homelessness and homeless young people aged 16 to 24 indicators mean that these indicators which were also due to be updated this month cannot be updated in 2019-20.

- Annual update to reproductive health indicators

On 05 November, the reproductive health indicators in the [Sexual and Reproductive Health Profiles](#) in PHE's Fingertips tool were updated. The indicators cover topics such as abortions, birth outcomes and contraceptive use and are available for upper tier local authorities, PHE centres and England. Some indicators are also available for lower tier local authorities.

- **National Cardiovascular Health Intelligence Network (NCVIN)**

- NHS Health Check dashboard

PHE and NHS Digital have jointly published an interactive data [dashboard](#) on NHS Health Check primary care data. This dashboard provides the number of patients attending an NHS Health Check between April 2012 and March 2018, using data

recorded by participating GP practices. Data on over 10 million patients was extracted in 2018. Data can be broken down by age, sex, ethnicity as well as local authority and CCG. This first release will provide new insight into the characteristics of people attending or not attending a check. The richness of this data is significant and will help to improve our understanding of the programme's impact and inform what action is needed to improve service delivery and outcomes. PHE and NHS Digital are now jointly working towards releasing a range of metrics in several phases on this dashboard. - **National End of Life Intelligence Network (NEoLCIN)**

- **Palliative and end of life care profiles: November update**

The [Palliative and end of life care profiles](#) are designed to improve the availability and accessibility of information for local government and health services to improve care at end of life. The data update includes eight indicators with new 2018 data and refreshed 2009 to 2017 data describing place of death and cause of death for clinical commissioning groups (CCGs), strategic transformation partnerships (STPs) and strategic clinical networks (SCNs):

- percentage of deaths in each place of death (hospital, own home, care home, hospice, other places) by age at death (all ages, under 65 years, 65 to 74 years, 75 to 84 years, 85 years and older)
 - percentage of deaths with specific causes of death (cancer, circulatory disease, respiratory disease) by age at death (all ages, under 65 years, 65 to 74 years, 75 to 84 years, 85 years and older)
